

- ACS produces new estimates in 1-, 3-, and 5-year estimates for larger geographies
- OSI almost always uses 5-year estimate data
 - Biggest sample size, less margin of error
- In December 2022, the Census Bureau released the 2021 American Community Survey (ACS) data.
- The 2022 Socioeconomic Profile is an analysis of the new data (2017-2021)

Arlington has seen an increase in population in different age cohorts across generations compared to 2010, with increases in all age groups over 50 years, and age groups between 10-39 years.












The total number of occupied housing units has increased by 2,455 since 2010. The percentage of occupied households that are owner-occupied has decreased by 0.9%.









Educational Attainment




Poverty



The poverty rate continues to decline. 14.0% of the City's population is currently estimated to be in poverty, compared to a peak of 17.5% in 2015.

Those under 18 years of age are the most vulnerable group, with 21.0% living under the poverty level.












Factors Affecting Urban Population Decline



- Natural Increase is declining
 - Deaths are outpacing births in 2020-2021
 - Over 2/3 US counties are experiencing natural decline
- Immigration is more difficult due to new federal policies
 - Slower increase in population attributed to foreign immigration
- Domestic Migration is the primary cause of change in populations
 - Improving economy & remote work makes relocation easier
 - Cost of living is lower in non-metro areas



Natural Increase in Arlington










The dependency ratio is the ratio of dependent population for every 100 people between 18-64 years of age. Dependent population is a combination of child dependents (under 18 years) and old-age dependents (over 65 years). A dependency ratio is considered to be "high" over 62.5.


The dependency ratio in Arlington increased from 55.7 to 57.6 between 2015 and 2021. This represents a 2.6 increase of the Old-Age Dependency Ratio and a 0.8 decrease of the Child Dependency Ratio.







Summary

Based on the 2021 ACS 5-year estimates, Arlington has experienced a slight decline in population. In 2021, the estimated population was 392,304. This is a reduction of 1,962 from the 2020 Decennial Census estimate of 394,266 and a reduction of 4,965 from the 2020 ACS 5-year estimates.

The city is also becoming more diverse. There has been an increase in the percent of population within the Black and Hispanic or Latino race and ethnicity groups (up 30.8% and 17.1% respectively since 2010). Age groups over 65 are experiencing the largest increases since 2010. On the other end of the age spectrum, there has been a decrease in the number of children under the age of 5 since 2010.

Unemployment rates rose in 2020 but dropped back to pre-pandemic levels in 2021. Residents are mainly dependent on individual vehicular travel (79.8%) and the average travel times to places of work have slightly increased since 2010.








Employment

Occupations & Median Income

Unemployment in Arlington fell 5.4% in 2021, which is a 2.4% decline from the 2020 rate.





